FIT DOG is an AKC program to promote exercise for dogs and their humans. Your dog can earn FIT Dog titles (Bronze, Silver, and Gold) by completing different exercise activities. There are six different categories of fitness activities: AKC FIT DOG Course (taught by a certified instructor), Runs (community runs like Turkey Trot), Walks and Hikes (independent or group), Unique to You and Your Dog (swimming, parkour, etc.), AKC Title (agility, dock diving, FAST CAT, etc.), and AKC Parent Club Performance Titles (pack dog, sledding, etc.) More information about the titles can be found on the AKC website.

Additionally, the AKC has developed a program to create FIT DOG Clubs. AKC FIT DOG Clubs will either conduct at least 4 group fitness walks per year or conduct regularly scheduled canine fitness/conditioning classes. The group walks held by AKC FIT DOG Clubs may count towards a dog's FIT DOG title. Groups that are approved as AKC FIT DOG Clubs will receive a free banner with the AKC logo and the club's name. This is something TROCCW could pursue if desired. If we'd like to pursue it, we should try holding one or two group walks and seeing how we like it before applying to become a FIT DOG Club.

What is AKC Fetch?

- Welcome to AKC Fetch! When dog owners are asked about activities they like to do with their dogs, the most common responses are to take their dog for a walk and to play ball (fetch) with the dog.
- AKC Fetch titles were created as another activity in which owners could have fun with their dogs in the AKC Family Dog Program. Earning AKC Fetch titles provides opportunities for both physical and mental exercise. While some dogs are natural retrievers, AKC Fetch, especially at the advanced levels, will involve teaching new skills such as retrieving.

AKC Fetch is designed for all breeds.

- AKC Fetch is a pass-fail noncompetitive test. The four levels of titles (Novice, Intermediate, Advanced, and Retriever) assess the ability of the dog to retrieve. In the Advanced and Retriever levels, the dog must respond correctly to signals. There is also a memory component in Advanced and Retriever because a retrieving bumper or ball is dropped (or thrown) behind a blind where it cannot be seen.
 - For each of the four titles, the dog must pass the test twice under two different approved AKC Fetch judges.
- Dogs who are at least 6 months of age are eligible to take the AKC Fetch test as long as they are registered or enrolled with AKC and have an AKC, PAL, or AKC Canine Partners number.

Why Participate in AKC Fetch?

- AKC Fetch provides a form of exercise for dogs and their owners. Dogs learn new skills and many handlers will learn to teach a skill (i.e., retrieving) they have not previously taught.
- AKC Fetch titles are fun to earn and can be used as a required AKC title for earning the Gold level of AKC FIT DOG. For info on AKC FIT DOG, see: https://www.akc.org/sports/akc-family-dog-program/akc-fit-dog/





Strawberry love hearts

Ingredients:

- · 32g Greek yoghurt
- 3-4 large strawberries finely chopped

Method:

- 1. Finely chop the strawberries
- Add a few pieces of strawberry to each section of a love heart silicone mold, or add them to an ice cube tray
- Pour the Greek yoghurt over the finely chopped strawberries and put in the freezer for 3-4 hours, or overnight
- Once the mixture is frozen, pop them out
- Once you have taken out your dog's allocated portion for that day, transfer the rest into a sandwich bag and place them back into the freezer for next time






Outdoor Winter Fun With Your Dog

Skijoring

Skijoring, a popular Scandinavian sport, has caught on in the U.S. It translates to "ski-driving" and combines cross-country skiing with some of the same skills as dog mushing. It requires one or two dogs that weigh over 35 pounds and enjoy pulling, cross-country skiis and poles, a pulling harness for your dog, skijoring belt, and a towline. Basically, you're cross-country skiing with your dog leading the way.

Although you might think it's a sport meant only for northern dog breeds like Siberian Huskies, almost any dog that loves running, weighs enough, and is tall enough to negotiate snow makes a great skijoring partner.

Skijoring is becoming so popular that there are even competitions, with regional and national championships. So whether you're longing for some winter competition or just love the quiet and exhilaration of skiing a fresh trail through snow, skijoring is wonderful exercise and a great bonding opportunity for both of you.



Kicksledding

If you and your dog are not quite ready for the Iditarod but love the idea of mushing, try kicksledding. Developed in Scandinavia as a way to navigate icy streets, kicksledding requires a sled, harness for your dog, and towline.

It's not meant for deep snow and works best on flat, slick surfaces or packed snow. It also requires that your dog learn some kicksledding cues since they must respond to your voice commands. While not quite as complicated or taxing as mushing, be prepared for a pretty vigorous workout.

Snowshoeing

For a gentler winter workout, try snowshoeing with your dog. All you need are snowshoes, belt, harness, and towline. Depending on how adventurous you're feeling and how much exercise your dog can handle, a snowshoe outing can be as leisurely as gliding through familiar trails and parks or as rigorous as making your way through deep powder.

Canicross

You don't need snow to enjoy winter activities with your dog. <u>Canicross</u> is cross-country running, but as a team, with your dog in the lead. Canicross requires minimal equipment. Your dog will need a well-fitting harness in which they have the freedom of movement to run. You'll need a waist belt and a bungee line.

As in kicksledding and mushing, the human is the driver, issuing voice commands, so your dog should know and respond to commands. Your choice of locale is virtually unlimited, from forest trails to local parks to the beach or the mountains. It's best to vary terrain between harder and softer ground since that will be easier on muscles for both of you. Although working breeds tend to be most popular for Canicross, any dog that likes to run and is in good shape can make a great Canicross teammate.

Scavenger Hunts

Who says you have to venture away from home to have outdoor adventures with your dog? How about a scavenger hunt in your own backyard?

Make little snow mounds or dig out shallow holes in the snow to hide treats and toys. Then have your dog use their nose (and eyes) to find them. Not only will they get exercise, but they'll also have to use tracking and problem-solving skills to find the prizes.

Indoor Winter Fun With Your Dog

Even on frigid, wet winter days, your dog will benefit from mental and physical activity. With a little ingenuity, you can both have some indoor fun. Whether it's playing hide-and-seek, learning new tricks, practicing Obedience training, setting up a DIY obstacle course, or treat puzzles for your dog, don't let being stuck indoors keep you both from having fun. Here are some indoor winter activities to get you started, as well as DIY cognitive toys.

Finally, and most importantly, before you embark on any adventures with your canine pal, assess whether it's appropriate for their age, size, abilities, and general health. If in doubt, check with your veterinarian. Once you're confident that you're both up for it, get out there and have some fun!



GUIDELINES

- 1. Please gate off the section you are working on during separate skills.
- 2. Please ask if the person is done using the equipment before you start working your dog.
- 3. Please have gating across the front while running full course agility.
- 4. Please have dogs on leash while entering and exiting the building.



A REMINDER FROM THE PAST PRESIDENT!

Because we have recently added many new members (YAY!!), here are a couple of reminders about training time:

- 1. Members set up the rings and courses. If you aren't able to help or arrive later, please don't jump in and start using things that others have spent the time setting up before they have had a chance to use the ring/course. We have Camp Bandy for this time frame only. Many hands make work light.
- 2. Crate your dog(s) unless you are working them in the ring/course or in a spot in the arena. Be mindful of other people and dogs.
- 3. Agility time is for a full course. Agility time is set aside so people can run full courses. If there are a lot of people, work together to change jump heights, etc. Gate off the area by the door.
- 4. Obedience rings should be used to work your dog either on a 'run thru' or a set of exercises for a reasonable amount of time. Everyone should have time in the ring. If you wish to work on an individual skill for agility, great. It means one piece of equipment (so no multiple pieces of agility equipment during obedience time).
- 5. Communicate with each other. If someone is taking too much time, tell them. If you need to leave in 20 minutes ASK if you can go next. If someone sets up a course or a ring say thanks. If you need help with something, ASK. This is a great group who is more than willing to help out.
- 6. If you put food on the walls to mark the go-out (or for any other reason) please clean up the spot, remove the food, etc.
- 7. If you are there alone or just a few people, work it out, if you don't need a ring, great. You don't have to set it up. You can be there for the full 3 hours or only 15 minutes.
- 8. Training time is meant to be used by any/all members. Keep in mind people use these times in different ways. Whatever way you use the time...enjoy training your dog!

Many great friendships have been made during this time!
